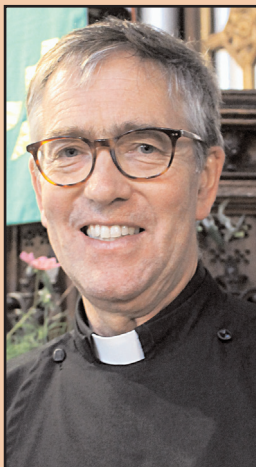

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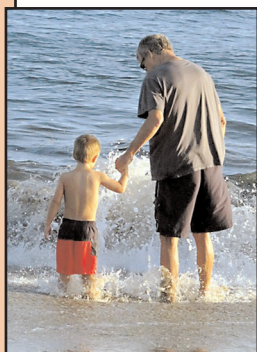

Harry Kane has described singing it with his teammates at the end of the Croatia match along with the huge crowd of fans as 'one of my favourite moments in an England shirt'.

Watching it from my armchair at home, everyone involved seems caught up in the huge emotion of the moment, a sort of welling up of celebration. And singing, typically with arms raised, is the way it's expressed. It's really easy to make the link with the informal, charismatic part of the worldwide Church, where worshipping God with heartfelt singing and arms raised is absolutely standard practice – but in this case caught up in the wonder of God's goodness.

In the traditional style of our local Church of England churches, we don't typically go in for quite that level of emotion! But if a fan is a person who has an intense admiring interest in something, then we certainly qualify, the object being God, our loving Creator, Redeemer and Sustainer, made known to us in Jesus Christ. 'Sing to the Lord a new song, all the earth; declare his glory among the nations' says the psalmist. Or alternatively come along and sing some great older songs – it's good for the soul!

What about a Pilgrimage?

(from Grapevine and British Pilgrimage Trust)

A pilgrimage – even a small one – is a commitment to take time out from the ordinary concerns of everyday life and to engage thoughtfully and mindfully with our spirituality. So as we walk, we commit to listening deeply to one another, to the world around us and to the person we might call God.

You are invited to come on a pilgrimage. Three days – walk as much or as little as you like – as we make the journey from Wareham to Salisbury, following the likely route over which the body of Saint Edward was carried 1000 years ago from his original resting place at the Priory Church of Lady St Mary in Wareham to the Abbey at Shaftesbury.

A pilgrimage is not just about the destination; it's about making the most of the journey. And so, as we walk, we will just have time to have a chat, but there will also be little bits of ritual along the way: there will be times of sharing the collective wisdom of the group and there will be times of walking in silence – a chance to reflect on our place within the creation that surrounds us.

Pilgrimage has been described as 'extroverted mysticism.' This journey is an invitation into deep connection and hopefully it will be fun, too.

If you are Interested in a more local

pilgrimage there are some options:

St Aldhelm's Way: This pilgrimage starts at St Aldhelm's church, Douling near Shepton Mallet where Aldhelm died in 709 and ends after approximately 74 miles at Malmesbury Abbey. The route uses existing footpaths.

The Athelstan Pilgrim Way is a new 100-mile walking and cycling route, linking all 36 historic churches in North Wiltshire Deanery. The route has been developed by the North Wiltshire Mission Area, a Church of England initiative in the Diocese of Bristol. The route takes in some of the Cotswolds Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, and the historic churches range from Bremilham, the smallest church in England, to Malmesbury Abbey, a popular visitor attraction. The route takes its name from the first King of a united England, Athelstan, a Christian ruler who chose Malmesbury as his capital and was buried in Malmesbury Abbey after his death in AD 939.

Crisis and Resilience Fund

This fund is run by Wiltshire Council and replaces the Household Support Fund, it is designed to provide more flexible financial support to residents experiencing hardship. There are four funding streams: crisis payments, housing payments, resilience services and community coordination.

A Crisis Payment is a discretionary payment to help with essential costs if you are experiencing a financial crisis. Wiltshire residents age over 16 may be able to get help if they are struggling to pay for things like:

- food

- energy or fuel
- essential household items
- other urgent living costs.

Crisis Payments are usually one off, short term payments. They are not intended to provide an alternative source of income. The amount awarded depends on individual circumstances.

All Crisis Payments are awarded at the Council's discretion.

150 Years of Mothers' Union

Mary Sumner Day is celebrated on 9th August each year. This year is the 150th Anniversary of Mary Sumner starting Mothers' Union in Hampshire.

Mothers' Union began in 1876. Mary Sumner, the wife of a rector in Hampshire, formed a group to support mothers from all backgrounds in bringing up their children. After delivering a speech in 1885 to the Portsmouth Church Congress, she inspired many women present to go back to their parishes and set up similar groups.

Over time, the groups that met as Mothers' Union became embedded in their communities. They forged strong links with local people and the Anglican Church. They worked to support one another and give a voice to disadvantaged women while addressing wider societal issues. Driven by Mary Sumner's passion for the role of women in bringing about a better society, the groups proved very popular.

By 1892, membership had reached 60,000 in 28 dioceses, which was to grow to 169,000 members by the turn of the century. In 1893, annual general meetings were organised, and, in 1896, Mothers' Union Central Council was formed.

Mothers' Union is a women-led, international Christian movement dedicated to ending poverty, violence and social injustice in communities in the UK and around the world.

Active for 150 years, with over 4 million members in approximately 84 countries, we work with people of all faiths and none, transforming lives, strengthening families and communities, and advocating for meaningful change.

Rooted in kindness, faith and compassionate action, we strive to create a better future where everyone has the opportunity and resources to thrive. (From Mothers' Union Website)

In Calne we will be celebrating 150 years with a special service in St Mary's Church on Monday 10th August at 2.00pm. The speaker will be Suzanne Waters who is Diocesan Treasurer for Salisbury Mothers' Union. There have also been celebration services at St Paul's Cathedral, London and Salisbury Cathedral. Please join us at St Mary's as we celebrate 150 years of Mothers' Union. The service will be followed by tea and cake.
