Thought for July & August

For I know the plans I have for you', declares the LORD, 'plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future'. *Jeremiah 29:11*

This is one of my favourite Bible verses; I'm sure you'll hear me mention it again sometime! For now, I want to focus on one word: 'hope'. It seems to me that hope is in very short supply outside the church, and we all need to know the reality of Christian hope.

In the world around us, there is very little hope on offer. Climate change, war, famine, disasters, struggling economies, the ongoing fallout from the pandemic all contribute to a future which looks very bleak.

But we can't live without hope. If there really is no hope of a better future, then the only alternative is despair. The great thing about the Christian hope is that it is a great deal more than a mild optimism (of the sort we exercise when we hope that our children might get into a good school, or that we might get a particular job). True Christian hope looks to the future with certainty. Christian hope is sure and certain because it is based on God's promises. A song I used to sing at school had the refrain: God has promised. God never breaks a promise he makes. His word is always true. And God has promised us some wonderful things. He has promised us that we will be raised from the dead (Acts 24:15; 1 Corinthians 15:52). He

has promised that he will make a new heaven and a new earth (2 Peter 3:13: Revelation 21:1). He has promised that he will wipe every tear from our eyes (Revelation 21:4). Our past experience, and our knowledge of Scripture, show us that God always keeps his promises, and gives us confidence that he will keep his promises for the future. So, in these uncertain times, no matter the circumstances, let's remember that we have every reason to hope. Let's share that hope with our nonbelieving friends, family and neighbours, especially when they are in despair. And let's echo Paul's praver below, as we pray for ourselves, and for one another:

May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit. (Romans 15:13)

Calne Welfare Charities

The current charity is an amalgamation of a number of previous small charities. It currently has three elements: Calne Almshouses, Relief in Need and Advancement in Life. They are run by six trustees and a clerk. The trustees must be Calne residents and include the incumbent (Caspar) *ex officio* and two Town Councillors. They meet about twice a year and deal with matters between meetings by email. common vestibule with the four individual doorbells giving good security. Residents must be Calne (or Calne Without) residents, 2 ladies and 2 men, aged 50+, and must be able to live independently. Replacement of the boiler led to an area becoming available for a communal washing machine, freeing areas in the 4 kitchens. There is an informal arrangement to share the garden with a gardener



Calne Almshouses – These were founded in 1684, as can be seen on the plaque outside, by the then Vicar of Bremhill and given to Calne Church to run. Originally they housed 8 widows of Calne. These dwellings were very small by today's standards. One room downstairs, probably used for daily life including housing small animals kept for food and a bedroom upstairs reached by a ladder. In the area behind there would have been a communal washing area.

Today they have been converted to 4 'cottages', with the upper rooms accessed by stairs and including a shower. The houses are maintained to a high standard and are subject to strict English Heritage rules. The 8 original oak doors can be seen outside, but are blocked inside to give more usable areas. The properties are accessed by a



an informal arrangement to e garden with a gardener employed for any 'heavy'work. Doug looks after all the maintenance requirements and is kept informed by the residents.

Other Charities. If trustees agree there is genuine need for either 'Relief in Need' or 'Advancement in Life'. It is rare for large sums

to be given as relief. For Advancement grants, some evidence of self-help is required. The aim is to encourage people, mainly young, to strive to improve their lives by stepping stones such as relevant courses or equipment for future careers. Confidentially is important, so news of success is only shared with permission. Schemes such as Calne Summer Play are also supported. Funding is from regular benefactors and investments (needed for the Almshouses) and contributions are always welcomed.

The Font

the Church of England, a font refers to the baptismal font, a container used to hold water during the ceremony of baptism. The only use of the font bowl is for the water for holy baptism. Traditionally placed near the main entrance, often to the left of the south door or near the west door, it symbolizes spiritual entry into the church.

Early fonts may have been placed straight on the ground but by the late medieval period, they were often raised on a plinth, sometimes even



steps. During the 13th century, ecclesiastical law required that all fonts have lockable covers. They can be made from stone, wood, metal or other materials. They are often octagonal in shape, connecting the eternal life of faith through baptism to the eight days between Christ's assumption of human sins to his resurrection.

The 15th century octagonal font in St Mary's Church, Calne has a curved base, with panelled sides with quatrefoil heads and a fine cover.


There will be uplifting worship; children's activities; space for fellowship and prayer, plus food.
