


Prayer for October

Thought for October

nother-in-law gave us a packet of sunflower seeds that had come free with a magazine, this year my wife Alice and I have had the simple pleasure of watching quite a good number of sunflowers grow in various spots around our garden. What was striking was how they flowered entirely independently of each other. One or two flowered in mid/late July. Others showed the faintest hint of a flower, and then stayed like that for weeks,



untill their time was ready. At the time of writing (mid-September) we still have just one left, its head now beginning to droop. Also, from somewhere in my consciousness I thought all the sunflowers would face the sun, whereas ours were a maverick bunch and seemed to face a variety of directions.

It struck me as an mildly interesting analogy with how we ourselves all operate at our own level/timing. Some of us are keen to rush on. Others prefer a more measured approach. Some people might be perceived as more handsome specimens than others, or are larger or smaller. Some flower together with others, and some are individualistic to the point they just want to do their own thing!

Of course for human beings to do well we have rather more factors to take into account than sunflowers. As far as we know sunflowers are not in competition about which flowers first - the processes just unfold according to circumstances. Whereas for we humans, some have all sorts of advantages in life given to them, while others may have to battle against all sorts of difficulties just to survive.

The idea of human flourishing is one which I think practically every person knows within themselves is of fundamental importance. But it raises challenging questions: how much am I concerned that not just my family and I but every person (and indeed every part of creation) has the possibility of flourishing? Is it possible that in attending to my own flourishing, I negatively affect someone else's? How should we apply this challenge to the issue of those seeking asylum in our safe country, whilst also taking into account this country's limited resources?

Christian teaching of course includes the call to love our neighbour as ourselves, to 'love the foreigner residing with you', and even to love our enemies (however we might define them). That might not make those big political decisions any easier, but starting from the point of loving and valuing all people regardless of how like us they are sounds like the sort of approach Jesus would take. In the letter to the Colossians we read this: 'clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience ... Forgive as the Lord forgave you. And over all these virtues put on love'

Saint Luke's Little Summer

his refers to enjoyable, summerlike days that happen around October 18. This is known as Saint Luke's Little Summer in honour of the saint's feast day.

Around this time, there is a brief period of calm weather, usually mild

and the leaves are starting to turn colours. Saint Luke is the patron saint of physicians and artists, he was also called Saint Luke the Evangelist, author of the Gospel According to Luke and the Acts of the Apostles, a companion of St Paul the Apostle.

Anglican Vestments

isiting different churches, the array of church vestments worn by the clergy can be confusing. The basic idea of the Anglican Vestments is to symbolise order, office, and role or function.

The basic white overgarment is known as either a Cassock, Alb or Surplice. Signifying the righteousness of Christ. These white robes are worn by clergy, (as well as choir members, altar servers, etc) who always wear the surplice over a cassock.

The Black Garment, also a Cassock, is technically not a vestment but everyday garb. Worn under a white surplice you can sometimes see other colours, often associated with colours of the cathedral church or the bishops' canons (assisting people).

The Eucharistic Vesture known as a Chasuble or Dalmatic is a piece of material, cut in a round or diamond shape, with an opening in the mid-

dle. Priests wear this over a cassock-alb during Euch-aristic services.

Scarves, also known as Stoles or Toppers are signs of order and office. A priest's stole hangs vertically over each shoulder. A deacon's stole hangs diagonally from the left shoulder and is secured on the right hand side. A deacon or priest wears these for non eucharistic offices at times or when not serving at the altar in a particular service.

Ministry. Lay ministers, readers, or choir members sometimes wear a cassock-alb or cassock and surplice with no stole (some use a blue reader's scarf, which isn't considered a stole).

The cincture is a belt for an alb or cassock. These come in band or rope alternatives. The colours of the over vestments worn change with the church seasons to match the altar cloths but this is not essential.
