In accordance with Government regulations church services are suspended from 5<sup>th</sup> November until 2<sup>nd</sup> December.

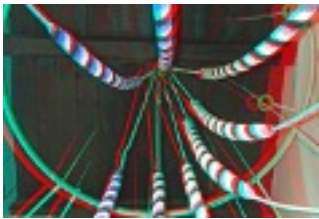

## Readings for St Martin of Tours

### Collect

God all powerful,  
who called Martin from the armies of this world  
to be a faithful soldier of Christ:  
give us grace to follow him  
in his love and compassion for the needy,  
and enable your Church to claim for all people  
their inheritance as children of God;  
through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord,  
who is alive and reigns with you,  
in the unity of the Holy Spirit,  
one God, now and for ever.

### Psalm 112:1-9

Praise the Lord!

Happy are those who fear the Lord,  
who greatly delight in his commandments.  
Their descendants will be mighty in the land;  
the generation of the upright will be blessed.  
Wealth and riches are in their houses,  
and their righteousness endures for ever.  
They rise in the darkness as a light for the upright;  
they are gracious, merciful, and righteous.  
It is well with those who deal generously and lend,  
who conduct their affairs with justice.  
For the righteous will never be moved;  
they will be remembered for ever.  
They are not afraid of evil tidings;  
their hearts are firm, secure in the Lord.  
Their hearts are steady, they will not be afraid;  
in the end they will look in triumph on their foes.  
They have distributed freely, they have given to the poor;  
their righteousness endures for ever;  
their horn is exalted in honour.

### Deuteronomy, chapter 15, beginning at verse 7

If there is among you anyone in need, a member of your community in any of your towns within the land that the Lord your God is giving you, do not be hard-hearted or tight-fisted towards your needy neighbour. You should rather open your hand, willingly lending enough to meet the need, whatever it may be. Give liberally and be ungrudging when you do so, for on this account the Lord your God will bless you in all your work and in all that you undertake. Since there will never cease to be some in need on the earth, I therefore command you, 'Open your hand to the poor and needy neighbour in your land.'

### Matthew, chapter 25, beginning at verse 34

Then the king will say to those at his right hand, "Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me." Then the righteous will answer him, "Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and

gave you something to drink? And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you?" And the king will answer them, "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me."

### An extract from *The Life of Saint Martin* by Sulpicius Severus (c.363-425 AD)

*One day during a particularly severe winter, a winter so extreme that many of the populace were dying of the cold, Martin was out on duty. He was wearing his soldier's uniform and was armed. He met in the gateway of the city of Amiens a poor man who was destitute of clothing. He was begging for help, but all passed by the poor man without even acknowledging his presence. When Martin, that man full of God, saw the poor man whom no one pitied, he questioned himself about what was best to do. He had nothing left save the cloak he was wearing, having already given away the rest of his clothes to the destitute. Unsheathing his sword, he cut his cloak in two, giving one half to the poor man, and wrapping the remaining half round himself.*

*At this, some of the bystanders started laughing because Martin looked so peculiar. He stood out from the other soldiers, being only partly dressed. Other people of more sensitive understanding, however, were deeply moved by his action, ashamed that they had done nothing themselves. They felt this particularly, having more than Martin that they could have clothed the poor man without reducing themselves to nakedness if they had wanted to. The following night, Martin fell into a deep sleep, and as he slept he had a vision of Christ arrayed in part of the cloak with which he had clothed the poor man.... He heard Jesus speaking to him quite distinctly, 'Martin...you have clothed me with this robe.' The Lord, mindful of his own words while on earth, (when he said 'Inasmuch as you have done this to the least of my brothers and sisters, you have done it to me') revealed that he himself had been clothed in that poor man.*



Martin was elected Bishop of Tours in 372, continuing his monastic lifestyle and ministry until his death in 397. Unlike many others, Martin was canonised not because of the way he died, but because of the way he lived.
