Editorial

October sees us well and truly into the season of autumn colour, mists and fruitfulness – a final burst of brightness and warmth before the darker, colder months envelop us. In 'October Ferry to Gabriola' author Malcolm Lowry notes that 'the fallen leaves in the



forest seemed to make even the ground glow and burn with light', in the way we might expect of the countryside and forests of Canada where the book is set. Let's hope that we too can witness such pleasures this autumn - who knows, there may be that elusive 'Indian Summer'.

However, some aspects of autumn were with us in mid-August as trees under stress due to intense heat and prolonged drought began to shed leaves and show some colour, albeit of a brownish tinge, very early. Trees are very important to our ecology with a single mature oak for example typically supporting some 2,300 species of which 326 are dependent on it alone. It is expected that mature trees will survive the ravages of our summer weather but younger trees with a less wellestablished root network may succumb. Even the mighty oak is one of a several tree species currently at risk, this time from the effects of the oak processionary moth, an accidental import on plants from overseas. Nature certainly seems to be under attack on many fronts.

The summer 2022 has demonstrated graphically how climate changes are disrupting weather patterns, producing greater extremes and having consequent effects on our environment and ecology, highlighting that we all need to play our part in mitigating its effects for future generations. Whilst there is autumn bounty to enjoy, there is loss too. Sadly, we will miss seeing the hedgehog who has shuffled around our own garden on most summer evenings this year as he or she heads towards their period of hibernation. So too the swallows, swifts and martins whose chatter and aerial acrobatics have now left our skies as they head south. We look forward to witnessing and enjoying their reappearance next spring as the natural world re-awakens.

Dear Friends,

Recently, while staying in Helmsley, North Yorkshire, I was fortunate enough to witness the culmination of the fourth stage of the Tour of Britain cycle race. From the perfect vantage point in the local

churchyard, I watched as police outriders with lights flashing and the odd siren preceded the



cyclists. The leading four riders flashed past, followed a few seconds later by the peloton, a colourful, tightly packed group of cyclists. Bringing up the rear were several team vehicles carrying spare bicycles.

I only recently understood that this is a team sport rather than an individual sport. A domestique is a road bicycle racer who works for the benefit of his team and leader. The French domestique translates as "servant". The word was coined in 1911, although such riders had existed before then.

Much of a cyclist's effort is to push aside the air in front of him. Riding in the slipstream of another rider is easier than taking the lead. The difference increases with speed. Racers have known this from the start and have ridden accordingly, often sharing the lead between them. From there it is a small step to employing a rider to create a slipstream while his leader rides behind him.



Domestiques provide basic and tactical support - they bring water and food from team cars and shield teammates from opponents. They help teammates with mechanical disasters – should the leader puncture a tyre, the domestique will cycle in front to create a slipstream allowing him to reclaim their position. A domestique

may also sacrifice her bicycle or wheel.

Domestiques race in the interest of the team, or against opposing teams. By putting themselves in a breakaway they force other teams to chase. In turn, they chase a breakaway that threatens their team.

Domestiques lead out sprinters by letting them 'draft' behind to conserve energy until the last few hundred metres. The lead-out train sometimes starts 10–15 km to the finish with up to eight domestiques setting a pace to discourage others from breaking away. One by one, worn-out teammates drop off. The last to lead a sprinter is often a good sprinter herself. The sprinter will launch into a dash to the line with one or two hundred metres to go.

It's not a perfect analogy, but there is plenty to reflect on in terms of serving sacrificially, self-forgetfulness and seeing that everyone has everything they need.

The Gospel message challenges and overturns human assumptions about power and greatness. Where we might define greatness in terms of status, fame, wealth etc... true greatness is defined in terms of servanthood – and let's be clear that this is not about legitimizing or perpetuating the oppression of vulnerable and marginalized people. God's power is not that which seeks to control and dominate, God's power is at work through love.

We often ask 'what's in it for me?', but Jesus asks us to give of ourselves and our resources so that others will be blessed. In our present culture, this is a really different way of seeing the world. It's what makes us different and it's the foundation of the Kingdom of the self-giving God. It's worth noting 'peloton' is a Greek word meaning 'daring' or 'fearless'... Blessings,

The Night Sky in October

This month really sees the return to darker night skies meaning that celestial viewing can take place at a more sociable hour. This is emphasised by the ending of British Summer Time on 30^{th} October. The

night sky continues to be dominated by the gas giant Jupiter which continues its brilliance low in the southern sky as it tracks from East to West before it sets at around 02.00h. On the evening of 8 October at 20.00h the planet will be located immediately above the nearly Full Moon low in the southeastern sky. During the month Saturn will be to the right of and a little lower than Jupiter before it too sets at around 03.00h.

Mars rises at around 20.30h and can be located low in the eastern sky. Its reddish tinge brightens during the month as Earth and the red planet come closer together. Towards month's end, in the same part of the sky at around 21.00h, Mars will be just above the top part of Orion as the constellation begins its reappearance to dominate our winter night sky. Betelgeuse, one of Orion's component stars, can be identified as it too has a red tinge. Most





of Orion will be visible towards the end of next month.

25 October will see a partial eclipse of the Sun visible across Europe and north-east Africa. Around 15% of the Sun will be covered when maximum is reached at around 11.00h. As usual, please do not look directly at the Sun to view the event as damage to eyesight will occur.



The darker skies of the evening of 21/22 October provide a great opportunity to witness the maximum of the Orionid meteor shower which consists of debris from Halley's Comet crashing into the Earth's atmosphere. They will emanate from the eastern part of the sky and skies remain dark until the Moon rises at around 03.30h.



Sir Samuel Romilly and the chance meeting of his future wife at Bowood House

A chance meeting at Bowood House in 1796. The couple announced their engagement 10 days later and within the year had married. Lady Anne Romilly died at only 45 in 1818. Four days later Samuel died. He was a lawyer, a reformer and spoke against the slave trade.

The event which formed the happiness of Romilly's life for twenty years was his marriage. This took place in 1798, when he was forty: and of the first meeting with his future wife, and the courtship, he wrote this account, but little more than twelve months before the eyes of both husband and wife were closed in death. "On the 14th of September, left Chevenage for Bowood. We stayed there ten days. The amiable disposition of Lord and Lady Lansdowne always renders this place

delightful to their guests. To me, besides the enjoyment of the present moment, there is always added, when I am at Bowood, a thousand pleasing recollections of past times; of the happy days I have spent, of the various society of distinguished persons I have enjoyed, of the friendships I have formed here; and above all, it was here that I first saw and became known to my dearest Anne.

If I had not chanced to meet with her here, there is no probability that I ever should have seen her: for she had never been, nor was likely, unmarried, ever to have come to London. To what accidental causes are the most importance occurrences of our lives some times to be traced! Some miles from Bowood is the form of a white horse grotesquely cut out upon the down, and forming a landmark to a wide extent of country.



To that object it is that I owe all the real happiness of my life. In the year 1796, I made a visit to Bowood. My dear Anne who had been staying there for some weeks, with her father and her sisters, was about to leave it. The day fixed for their departure was the eve of that on which I arrived; and if nothing had occurred to disappoint their purpose, I never should have seen her. But it happened that, on the preceding day, she was one of an equestrian party which was made to visit this curious object: she over-heated herself by her ride; a violent cold and pain in her face was the consequence. Her father found it indispensably necessary to defer his journey for several days, and in the mean time I arrived. I saw in her the most beautiful and accomplished creature that ever blessed the sight and understanding of man. A most intelligent mind, an uncommonly correct judgment. a lively imagination.

uncommonly correct judgment, a lively disposition, a noble and generous way of thinking, an elevation and heroism of character, and a warmth and tenderness of affection, such as is rarely found even in her sex, were among her extraordinary endowments.

I was captivated alike by the beauties of her person and charms of her mind. A mutual



attachment was formed between us, which, at the end of a little more than a year, was consecrated by marriage. All the happiness I have known in her beloved society, all the many and exquisite enjoyments which my dear children have afforded me, even my extraordinary success in my profession, the labour of which, if my life had not been so cheered and exhilarated, I never could have undergone, - all are to be traced to this trivial cause."

"What man is happy till he knows his end?" is a feeling so universally acknowledged that its truth must be admitted as inherent in the human mind.

Yet reason would decide in favour of a long life of happiness though overcast for a little at the close, instead of a career of toil and privation to be crowned at last by a transient enjoyment."

Concessionary bus pass

Great news – we've removed the 9.30am time restriction on all concessionary bus passes, until Friday 31 March 2023.

This means that you can travel on any buses in Wiltshire for free at any time of the day.

There are many wonderful places to explore across our beautiful county, especially as summer turns to autumn. Our Connecting Wiltshire travel website has several ideas and includes a journey planner if you prefer to design your own bus days out.

Calne Without Parish Council

Last month Calne without Parish Council held a very successful energy saving and advice day. Copies of the slides used during the event can be found on our social media and website.

We will be watching the weather carefully to begin the loaning out of thermal imaging cameras that we mentioned in the last article. The Council has purchased two thermal imaging camera, which we'll be loaning out for free to residents. These cameras enable users to identify the colds spots in their homes, where they're losing the most heat.

We'll be launching this scheme as soon as the outside temperature drops below 10°C, if you'd like to take part, you can register now by emailing Cllr John Barnes at john.barnes@calnewithout-pc.gov.uk.

As you travel around the Parish you should see our two new Speed Indicator devices. These will be located around the parish on the local roads to help remind drivers to keep within the speed limit. Sid will smile if you are below the speed limit.

I'd like to finish by sharing a message from the Chairman of the Parish Council following the death of HM Queen Elizabeth II.

"At this moment of great national sadness it's hard not to focus entirely on Her Majesty the Queen's incredible dedication to serving the nation. However, we should remember that Queen Elizabeth II was also a mother, grandmother and great grandmother whose family are now in mourning. On behalf of the Parish Council and our local communities I would like to express our heartfelt condolences to her immediate family.

In 1947 she devoted her whole life "whether long or short" to serve our country and its people, and she has stood by that pledge to the very end. Her commitment to duty and public service over her long lifetime has never wavered.

Her Majesty the Queen was universally admired, respected and held in great affection as our cherished sovereign. That admiration, affection and respect came to the fore in our parish in June of this year, when people joined together to commemorate and celebrate her Platinum Jubilee.

For myself, and the vast majority of us, the late Queen Elizabeth has been the only monarch on the throne for the whole of our lives. She was a constant that will be greatly missed; our nation has lost a treasure."

Congratulations.....Yes, but.....

"Congratulations", he said, "it is 8 years since the first 3 defibs were installed in the village, I remember them going in!" "and its four years since the one in Studley at Sunny View" his friend said, that's great isn't it ? "



"Yes, but".... I started to say, "that's multiples of 4 though, and that's not good for us!"

Why so, I hear you all ask? Is this a mathematical puzzle?

Well it's not good because defib batteries have to be replaced every 4 years, which means this year we have to buy 4 new batteries at £265 each, as well as replacing electrode pads at £50 a set whenever they are used or go out of date – so this year we are facing absolutely horrendous costs - over £1,200 !!!

So, I want to ask all villagers to see it they can help us keep our defibs going. Maybe you can join our team (just a few hours a year) or make a regular annual standing order payment of just £5 to:





Book Review

The Dictionary of Lost Words by Pip Williams

The Dictionary of Lost Words is the debut novel of Australian writer, Pip Williams and is based on real events. It concerns the compilation of the Old English Dictionary, (OED) which began in 1879 and was not completed until 1928. The story is told through the eyes of the fictional character of Esme, who is the daughter of one of lexicographers involved who were led by Sir James Murray.

As a child Esme grows up fascinated by words and how they are scrolled, cut up and pinned to slips in the pigeon holes of the Scriptorium ready for edit and inclusion into the OED. Her life is interwoven with both real and fictional characters from Oxford of



that time, the sights and sounds of the city and her own personal journey collecting and compiling her own dictionary of those words deemed 'less important'.

The novel explores the complexity but also the beauty of language as well as exploring the gender politics of language in the patriarchal society of that time. It is told against the background of historic events such as W.W.I., the woman's suffrage movement in the UK and privilege versus servitude.

Everyone at book club thoroughly enjoyed this book. If you love words and are interested in their meaning and interpretations you will too.

To Gigaclear or not to Gigaclear

As my broadband and telephone provider (BT) contract was coming to an end in August I decided to take the plunge and swop to Gigaclear. My reasons for doing this were mainly to get rid of the need for a landline with the saving of about £20 a month, plus the hope of faster up and download speeds.

Having talked to one of their sales team for about 20 minutes to get various assurances on such things as how long it takes for them to come along (week to 2 weeks), and how long to fit it in, I took the plunge.

Essentially, I went for the slowest and therefore cheapest (£17pm) broadband option: 200Mbps up and download speeds, which is faster that I was getting with BT by a mile. I also went for the most expensive telephone deal £9 (There are three call plans from £3 to £9) which is Anytime Plus and is inclusive of most landline numbers and mobiles 24/7.

The appointed day came and the engineer turned up on time and informed me of the path they would like to take through my front garden (which was fine) and agreed the position of their box in my lounge – exactly where I wanted it.

The whole process took about 2 hours and it was a clean job. The engineer explained what all the kit was and that my existing line number would be ported over to their service in about a week. My phone was on a temporary Gigaclear landline number I could use in the meantime. I hadn't cancelled my BT line so I could still use this as well with an old phone I had connected to my BT socket.

So far everything has worked fine. The upload speed is much quicker and the download a bit faster. The telephone works fine and we can still use our mobiles using the wi-fi calling system.

I did have a query about the download speed and an email to them was replied to within 24 hours.

I haven't got any connection (!) with Gigaclear and they aren't paying me or the magazine for this article. This is just an airing of my thoughts on the matter and what happened.


