Editorial

After a very busy May we reach mid-summer this month. Last month hosted three Bank Holiday Mondays and the momentous coronation of King Charles for us to enjoy. The coronation weekend provided another opportunity for a range of community events across the villages and whilst the weather could have been better, thanks are due to all those involved with the organisation and implementation of the activities which were appreciated by so many.

Mid-summer in pagan times was a festival of magic and mysticism, falling around the 24th of the month rather than at the solstice and in some parts of the Europe, especially in the Nordic and Baltic states it remains an important day of celebration. In Sweden, where there is a day length of some eighteen and a half hours in the capital – much longer in the northern part of the country - it is a time of dancing, singing and drinking, wearing flowers and enjoying pickled herrings, new potatoes, chives and sour cream!

In parts of this country, activities included the lighting of bonfires on the eve of mid-summer and leaping over them as some sort of act of purification or rite of fertility. No doubt though that this period might well have been a final excuse for celebration and merriment before the forthcoming hard work of the harvesting season loomed into view!

Later, the Christian church used the date when it designated 24 June as the Feast Day of St John the Baptist, with bonfires being lit on high ground on the evening before. Such bonfires are still a theme of rural life in some locations, including a few in Cornwall and occasionally locally at Foxham for example. The Golowan and Mazey Day celebrations centred on Penzance and West Cornwall at this time of the year are reminders of the former importance of this date in the calendar.

Closer to home, the summer solstice events at Stonehenge also give us a reminder of how important mid-summer was in past times and for some still is.

Looking at this month in history, 6 June will of course once again remind us of the D-Day landings in Northern France and back in the days of the First World War, on 19 June 1917, the Royal Family renounced their German names and titles (Saxe-Coburg-Gotha) in favour of 'Windsor'.

Lastly, on 27 June 1967 Barclays Bank officially dispensed cash from their first ATM machine which was located in Enfield Town in North London.

These machines have proliferated ever since until the last few years when many have disappeared with the mass closure of bank branches around the country.

However, you choose to mark the halfway point of the year, enjoy the month and all that it has to offer.

Dear Friends,

4th June is when the Church remembers Petroc, Abbot of Padstow. One of the patron saints of Cornwall, according to tradition, after founding a monastery at Padstow, St. Petroc founded another monastery in Bodmin in the 6th Century. It seems Petroc (or Pedrog in Welsh tradition) was the son of a Welsh chieftain. Some say that the appalling bloodshed of battle caused him to break his spear and turn instead to God, dedicating his life to the service of peace.

One legend tells of Petroc travelling as far afield as India. Years later he returned with a tame wolf who guarded his staff and sheepskin. The broken spear and the tame wolf symbolise the power of love to overcome chaos and destruction. That might sound naïve in a world where the force of power seems to prevail.



Yet, when speaking of the fruit of the Spirit, St. Paul listed love, joy, peace, patience, goodness, kindness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Is this all just a little bit fluffy?

Aristotle spoke of the virtues in terms of the mean between two extremes. He defined gentleness, for example, as the mean between being too angry and never being angry at all. It seems to me that a person motivated to act in response to the sufferings of others (acting at the right time, for the right reason and in the right way) exercises far more authentic strength, where all the qualities mentioned above come into play, than a 'might is right' approach.

'Nothing is so strong as gentleness, nothing so gentle as real strength' so said Francis de Sales, C16th French bishop and apparently the patron saint of writers and journalists...

Something to ponder while munching on a celebratory pasty or cream tea (remember jam first, then cream).

Many of you will have heard that I will be leaving the parish in July and retiring to Cornwall - my last letter will be in next month's issue of inSPIRE. My last service will be at Christ Church, Derry Hill on 9th July and there will be further details in due course.

The good news is that a new Team Rector - Rev'd Caspar Bush - has been appointed. Caspar and his wife Alice will be moving into the Vicarage in Calne in September.

Caspar writes: 'My wife Alice and I are really delighted to be on our way to the Marden Vale Benefice. I was so impressed at the commitment, enthusiasm and warmth of those I met when I came for interview, and I'm very much looking forward to being with you to work out together how our churches can best serve our communities in the years ahead. North Wiltshire feels quite like home for us - it's where Alice grew up, and where we were married, and it's close to our parents and our three adult children. I'm expecting to be licensed in September but await a firm date from the Diocese'.

Many of you will also have met Rev'd Annie Church (retired priest) who lives in Studley and has been taking services. We have also recently commissioned two new Lay Worship Leaders (Peter Rigby and William Wyldbore-Smith). Peter has already led some services in Derry Hill. Together with Rev'd Teresa Michaux and Licensed Lay Ministers Enid Powell and Steven and Jenny Colby they will be leading worship across all the parishes in the Marden Vale Team.

The Night Sky in June

This year appears to have passed so quickly and June sees the summer solstice at 14.58 on the 21st giving us 16hrs 36mins of daylight. In Yellowknife in Canada's North West Territories the locals will be enjoying twenty hours of daylight, though they pay for it in mid-winter! The solstice occurs when the Sun reaches its most northerly point in the sky. At this time of the year, the night sky never really darkens as the Sun only descends to a maximum of 18 degrees below the horizon, making star gazing more difficult this month, especially on moonlit nights.

However, there is a phenomenon which is well worth seeing and which is only available to us for a few weeks either side of the summer solstice from around 23.30h, high in the northern sky for a couple of hours – noctilucent clouds. These



are high-level clouds forming at some 75-85km above the earth's surface at the edge of space. We see them because they are so high that the sun continues to illuminate them even though it has long disappeared below the horizon. They are thin, wispy curls of cloud, and are a blue/white or silver colour but they are difficult to predict when and for how long they will be visible.

In terms of planetary activity, brilliant Venus dominates the western sky during the evening until it sets at around midnight. Mars too remains visible, but not nearly as bright as it was earlier in the year. However, it will be possible to observe both our neighbouring planets as they come close together towards month's end. On 21^{st} of the month at around 23.30h low in the western sky, the thin crescent Moon will have Venus to its left with Mars and its reddish tinge a little further to the left of the planet. To the right of this trio and closer to the horizon the twin stars of Castor and Pollux can be located. On the following evening at the same time, the Moon will have Mars and Venus to its right and a little lower in the sky. On 3 June at around 23.30h low in the eastern sky, the almost Full Moon will pass just above the giant star Antares which has a brighter reddish colouring than Mars.

Jupiter has returned to our skies but unfortunately as a morning object, rising at around 03.30h. The gas giant will be easily identifiable shining brilliantly low in the Eastern sky. Early risers and insomniacs will be able to see the Moon draw very near to the planet at 03.45h on 14 June. Four days earlier on 10 June at 04.00h in the South-eastern sky the Moon will be located just below and to the left of Saturn.






The Glass House by Eve Chase

The title of the book can be interpreted in several ways. There is, of course, the proverb about people in glass houses, next the fact that the Harrington family around whom the story revolves run a company called Harrington Glass and then there are the terrariums which play a pivotal role in the plot.

The structure of the book is similarly intricate. We follow events in two timelines, 1970 and the present day. Although there is a murder, unsolved for much of the book, this is not a detective story, rather it is an investigation into the effect of that murder on the various people involved in its discovery.

Well written, the Forest of Dean is beautifully described and provides



an atmospheric backdrop to important events in the book and the characters are well rounded and believable. The Glass House is an 'easy read' but some of our members felt it was not very memorable, others found the resolution to the story was too perfect. What we've been doing in the last month

Coronation Celebrations

Over the last month we received funding requests from all corners of Calne Without Parish Council, in total we provided grant funding to four groups for their celebrations, Cherhill Village Hall, Calstone Access Group, Heddington and Stockley and Derry Hill and Studley Community Committee. It seems a very popular way to celebrate the coronation was with a Barn Dance, we hope you all had fun if you attended one of the local celebrations.

During the 'Big Help Out' the Parish Council led a project to improve a set of steps behind Barry Place down to Old Derry Hill. The results were fantastic and we hope you enjoy using these steps again.

Re-wiggling the River Marden

Calne Without Parish Council (CWPC) have been busy with a project that aims to restore habitats along the River Marden in Calne Without to enhance the area's aquatic and terrestrial biodiversity.

Working with staff from Bristol & Avon Rivers Trust, (BART)



CWPC volunteers collected woody branches and brash from trees along a section of the upper Marden in Calstone. In doing so they helped open up sections of the canopy to maintain a roughly 40:60 light to shade ratio for the stream to encourage greater aquatic plant colonisation.

At specified points along the river identified by BART, staff alongside volunteers secured aged chestnut stakes into the riverbed and packed the collected woody material to create wedge shaped structures jutting out into the river channel. These structures are called woody berms. The berms are secured using twine and designed to overtop in high flow conditions.

Creating woody berms helps add complexity to rivers, helping restore natural processes by creating areas of faster and slower flows and encouraging it to "re-wiggle" so increasing the micro habitats with benefits for a variety of species and communities. For example, our berms will help expose gravel habitat essential for trout spawning.

Over time the berms will in-fill with silt and bankside vegetation will colonise helping to stabilise the structure and blur the divide between the natural bank and our berms, opening the area to increase terrestrial biodiversity.

The 10th Vicar of Derry Hill

The 10th vicar of Derry Hill was Lionel Borradaile Bell (1945 to 1949).

Lionel was born in Pretoria South Africa on 11th January 1890 to Adam Borradaile Bell and Jane Anderson. Lionel married Alice Dorothy Chadwick in London in 1930. They had 5 children - Evelyn, Allan, William, Douglas and Louise.

Lionel and Alice left Derry Hill in 1949 to settle in Southern Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe) - selling lock stock and barrel in a sale at the vicarage.

Mr. Bell in reply acknowledged the help of the Master, and thanked his wardens, the Church Council, and a countless number of people who had given him every assistance. He also wished to acknowledge publicly the inspiration and assistance received from Mrs. Bell.

Mr. and Mrs. Bell are leaving Derry Hill immediately after Christmas to take up work in Southern Rhodesia.

We are undertaking an assessment of all sites that land owners have put forward to be considered as housing sites. National independent company AECOM are now assessing the individual sites to see which may be suitable for allocation for housing sites in the Neighbourhood Plan.

Running alongside this work, the Calne Community Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group commissioned a Housing Need Assessment (HNA) which helps us to understand the needs of the existing community and future residents, including, for example, affordable housing and housing for older people. 

Curiously, when she said that, something within me settled. All those big questions, crowding my mind... they were abstract problems. You couldn't touch them, like you could touch the lemon trees or the bougainvillea. And a bench in the garden where people could sit, and maybe heal from whatever was troubling them... you could touch that.

Right then, I began to appreciate the therapy of small things.

Fast forward to present times, to our little corner of Wiltshire. Last week, a young family friend came to stay, anxious and needing a break from uni. There was no handy tree trunk to turn into a bench. But I was looking after my neighbours' hens. So, I invited her to help me feed them.

As the hens tucked into lettuce, she visibly relaxed. "I needed this," she said.

And in that moment, I knew the therapy of small things had found another fan.




